2023 PROPERTY TAX INFORMATION

Tax bills are anticipated to be mailed sometime between December 5th – 10th. However, your bill may be available sooner at the Walworth County website at

https://ascent.co.walworth.wi.us/LandRecords/PropertyListing/RealEstateTaxParcel#/Search.

If the mailing address is incorrect, you can send a request to change the mailing address through the Walworth County website.

If your property is your primary residence as of January 1, 2023, please review your tax bill to make sure you are receiving the lottery credit. If you are not receiving this credit, our office can assist you to get the credit applied to your property tax bill.

We are also excited to announce that online credit card processing will be available this year!!

The online payment processing of property taxes would be available during the first installment collection period. The system will only accept payments for current year taxes and will not accept overpayments.

Online payments for 2023 property taxes payments will be processed through the Walworth County website. Instructions on how to use this feature will be available on our website once tax bills are available.

Fees for Online Payments

You can pay your taxes online via E-check for .50¢ (you will need to provide your checking routing & account number), via debit card or credit card (2.35% convenience fee on the amount you are paying).



LEAF COLLECTION

The Village will collect leaves via a vacuuming process in April and November. The Village will routinely collect leaves at weekly intervals, therefore, calls to schedule this service are not needed.

- Place leaves by the roadside in a long row rather than a big pile.
- No bags.
- No ashes (burned leaves will not be vacuumed).
- Absolutely no branches. To get rid of branches and sticks, please use the Brush Chipping program which can be found at www.williamsbay.org, or by calling 262-245-2700 and selecting option 9.
- Leaves on private driveways or alleys will not be collected.
- This service is provided for Improved Single Family Residential Properties only.







Williams Bay High School Receives Technical Education Grant

The Williams Bay School District is excited to announce that, with the generous support of Midwest Precision Molding of Lake Geneva, Williams Bay High School was one of seven Wisconsin school districts to be awarded the Department of Workforce Development's Technical Education Equipment Grants.

This grant financially supports educational institutions to acquire modern and industry-relevant equipment for their technical education programs. The belief behind that grant is that by equipping educational institutions with state-of-the-art tools, machinery, and resources students will receive handson training that aligns with the demand of today's job market.

Midwest Precision Molding graciously donated \$8,400 to fulfill the 50% required match to be awarded the grant. With the investment, the

Williams Bay School District was able to purchase the Amatrol Industry 4.0 Learning System. This system delivers classroom-based skill performance assessments evaluating how well a learner performs hands-on skills such as manufacturing metrics, PLC project development, and other skills that directly relate to real-world industrial skills needed in the workforce.

Midwest Precision Molding's support will allow Williams Bay High School students to receive training in advanced manufacturing practices to prepare for stable careers while they obtain dual enrollment credits, industry-endorsed certificates, and technical endorsements on high school diplomas.

Midwest Precision Molding has served as Wisconsin's leading provider of tight tolerance plastic injection molded parts. Their Lake Geneva facility is home to some of the most dynamic equipment arrangements in the Midwest. MPM was designated as a 2023 Future 50 company for the third time by BizTimes Media and the Metropolitan Milwaukee Associations of Commerce. Fiscal Update

It is officially fall and we are back at school and in the Business Office, this means budget season has kicked into high gear. The district will approve the budget and levy at the November meeting of the Board of Education. Until then, we sharpen our pencils and review budget estimates and finalize projections for the 2023-2024 school year and beyond. The term that has been floating around the state is the "fiscal cliff." This term could not describe what is happening in school finance any better.

Our district has maintained healthy, fiscally conservative operations for the past years but the 2024-2025 school year will truly be the drop off point.

Currently available ESSER funds (COVID relief money) were received via two grants. One grants sunsets on September 30, 2023 and the other on September 30, 2024. We drew down all funds from the ESSER grant with the 2023 deadline prior to the end of the 2022-2023 fiscal year. This action will show surplus/addition to the district's fund balance in 2022-2023, however those funds will remain the fund balance to assist with operation costs in 2023-2024 and beyond.

With three staff members' retirements and several departures at the end of the last school year, we were able to hold our district salaries in check for the 2023-2024 school year. With 18 new staff members and a 4% increase for our returning staff, 2023-2024 total wages increased just \$21,000. This coupled with a 16% health insurance cost increase makes the salary and benefit portion of the budget the largest cost to the district. This is of no surprise, however we are holding the line the best we can on this skyrocketing cost. District staff members have been invited to participate in a health insurance committee to review options and plan design changes to bring savings to the district while remaining a recruitment tool for new staff.

With a projected 22% increase in the district's equalized value, the mill rate is expected to drop over \$1.00 this winter. The school board and district safe will continue to maximize the levy to request a palatable, long-term solution for the district when we ask our tax payers for their support in April 2024.

Projections continue at \$1-3 million additional funds to be needed over the next four years due to the shortfalls of the state biennial budget and the current broken state funding formula. The School Board, District Administrator and Business Manager will engage directly with the community in as many ways as possible this fall to spread the world on the referendum and the needs of the district. This is an unprecedented time for Wisconsin school districts and the number of schools that plan to register for an April referendum will be one for the history books. We hope to see you this fall, to share our story, answer your questions, and gain your support as we all head to the polls in April.

Burn Ordinance

Open burns can take place Oct. 1st - Nov. 30th. Other restrictions include:

- Burning must be done daylight hours after 12pm.
- It must occur 25 ft from the nearest building on the same property & at least 100 ft. from the nearest building not on the same property.
- Burning must be confined by a control device or structure
- Burning cannot occur when the wind velocity exceeds 10 miles per hour.

For more information on open burns & campfire restrictions, go to the Village website and select Municipal Code. From there, type in "open burning" in the search box.

Winter Parking

Winter parking restrictions are enforced Nov. 15th through April 15th between the hours of 2:00am to 6:00am. During this timeframe, you are prohibited from parking or leaving a standing vehicle on any Village street - EVEN IF THERE IS NO SNOW ON THE GROUND. Please make sure your guests are aware of this.

In situations where you need to park on the street overnight, please call the police department prior to receive permission and/or instructions as

to where else you might park.

Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy


A note from the Chairman...

A recent article in "Only in Your State" once again shows what a wonderful place Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy is, nestled in the charming village of Williams Bay. It starts out, "In the bustle of the Lake Geneva area, it's still possible to connect with the quiet side of nature in a beautiful setting. Kishwauketoe is a hidden gem nestled in Williams Bay, Wisconsin.

This article really captures what Kishwauketoe has to offer, from the enthusiastic hiker to the family that is just looking for a relaxing walk in nature. Looking back 33 years now, when I was Village President and there were numerous developers trying to turn this property into a major development, which could have included high-rises and mid-rises as well as one plan that called for a space Needle hotel at the east corner near the lake-front, a row of Town Houses along Southwick Creek next to Hwy 67 and the list goes on.

There was meeting after meeting with the meeting halls filled with residents demanding that we do not allow any development of this lakefront property. Suddenly, they discovered the Village Board bought the property for 1.56 million dollars and then things changed to, we didn't want you to buy it, but rather stop the development. Well this had been done before and we knew would not stop in the future. The citizens were concerned with what the future costs would be to the taxpayers, if the Village owned the property. At this point we announced that we were going to make it into a Nature Park and there would be no cost to the property owners as we would cover all costs, through Donations and Volunteer Labor. This has all worked out very successfully for 33 years now, where we offer nature at its finest along with many programs, education, etc. for people to take part in and enjoy, 12 months out of the year. As our one shirt that we sell says, "Take A Hike" and I can't think of anything better to do.
