Brush Chipping



The Village will chip brush and sticks on Tuesdays (weather permitting) throughout the year. Please arrange for this service online at www.vi.williamsbay.wi.gov, or by calling (262) 245-2700 ext. 9 and leave your name, address and phone number when prompted. Calls made by noon on Mondays will be scheduled for chipping on Tuesday. Place brush and sticks by the roadside with the cut ends facing the road. Sticks with a diameter of 6" or less are an acceptable size for chipping. Christmas Trees are accepted at the curb in January. No phone call needed. There is no charge if chipping takes 10 minutes or less. Brush and sticks left by the road without scheduling will not be chipped. For Improved Single Family Residential Properties Only.

Dog License(s)

Please remit a separate check for your dog license fees. Licenses are to be renewed every year. All dogs five (5) months of age by the first of the year are required to have a dog license. Licenses must be obtained by March 31st. After that date, a \$5.00 penalty will be charged. You must provide a current proof of rabies vaccination certificate (not the tag) for each dog to be licensed. Check should be made payable to the Village of Williams Bay. Fees are \$15.00 for an altered male or female and \$30.00 for an unaltered male or female. Dog Licenses are required by State Statute, and they help us reconnect you with your dog if your dog is lost. They also ensure that dogs in the community have been properly vaccinated

Winter Parking Reminder

There is **NO overnight parking** between **2:00am** and **6:00am** on any Village Streets from **November 15th - April 15th**. This applies even if there is no snow on the ground.

If there is a Snow Emergency, there is to be **NO PARKING** at **ANY TIME** on Village Streets. Exceptions can only be granted through the PD. If you need to park on the street, you must call the PD in advance and receive permission.

Going out of town?

If you are going out of town, whether short-term or long-term, please take a few moments to fill out our House Check form online. This form can be found on the village website (www.williamsbay.org). From the homepage, hover over "Government," then select "Police Department" from the drop down menu. Once on the PD's page, you will see a green button on the left entitled "Village of Williams Bay House Check." Fill out the prompts the form gives you, hit submit, and we will have immediate access to it.

Officers will do some additional patrols around your home while you are gone and, unless you specify otherwise, officers will check the perimeter of your home, making sure doors and windows have remained closed.

The only time you need to contact the PD directly is if you are extending your stay or coming back earlier than planned. The latter is extremely important as we don't want to surprise you if we show up to check your home and you've come home a couple of days early.





Youth Apprenticeship: Bridging Futures, Shaping Careers By: Mr. Will Welch, Associate Principal

Youth Apprenticeship (YA) is a state-wide initiative aimed at helping high school students explore and determine their future career paths. Through partnerships with local employers across diverse industries, the program provides students with paid work experience, mentorship, and industry-specific skills. By integrating classroom learning with practical training, YA empowers students to make informed decisions about their future careers. This focused approach ensures that YA participants graduate with a clear understanding of their interests and a solid foundation for future success in the workforce.

There are, as of the 2023-2024 school, 13 occupational program areas with over 70 different occupational pathways students can pursue for a YA. A new occupational program this

school year is education; one of our seniors, Loralei Warrenburg, is participating as a YA in this program area, specifically in the school age education pathway, working in our very own elementary school! Loralei's mentors during her YA are Mrs. Maggie Bailey and Mrs. Gabe Olson.

Loralei became interested in education as a possible career choice during her time in Ms. Durkin's Junior Seminar class. To pursue this path further, she signed up for two education related courses through Gateway Technical College for the first semester of her senior year: Foundations of Early Childhood Education and Infant/Child Development. As she was already enrolled in these related classes and volunteering in the elementary school, officially working as a youth apprentice was a no-brainer choice for Loralei. She works hard with the 5th on math, specifically multiplication and with the second graders, she has spent a lot of time working on their spelling. When asked about some of the biggest things she has learned, Loralei said, "I think one of the biggest things is just the planning and prep that goes into teaching. Watching Mrs. Bailey set her classroom up, writing things on the board, so she's ready to go for her kids has been important for me to see." Loralei expressed how much she has enjoyed working with our elementary schoolers. "I just really enjoy my time with the kids, this experience has definitely allowed me to see that I do want to become a teacher someday." Loralei plans to attend UW-Whitewater upon graduating from Williams Bay.

Williams Bay School District Faces Financial Cliff: Protecting Our Future Together By: Dr. Williams White, District Administrator

The Williams Bay Board of Education will be discussing the financial forecast, how to continue to be excellent financial stewards, and if a referendum question should be presented to the community on the April 2024 ballot. The Administration and the Board of Education invite your feedback prior to these discussions at the December and January regular monthly board meetings.

In Wisconsin, all school districts operate under a revenue limit that caps the amount of money they can receive through state aid and local property taxes. Districts are turning to referendums for a confluence of reasons, including inflation trends and declining state

unding. In fact, the state anticipates that an extremely high number of school referendums will be on the ballot this April in Wisconsin and 82% of Wisconsin school districts have pursued an operating referendum since 1992.

Declining enrollment, inflation, and years of stagnant or declining state funding per pupil, have placed the Williams Bay School District's exceptional student programs in jeopardy. The bottom line is that Wisconsin's school funding revenue limit will not allow the District to maintain its current level of funding which will not allow us to protect the quality of education that our children currently experience.

This funding is critical to support our students, our staff, our community services, and our financial position for future years. Our schools are at the heart of our community and our tradition of excellence depends on an operating referendum to preserve the programs and services that define Williams Bay.

The District reduced expenditures to constrain increase costs due to inflation in the 2023–2024 budget and is already planning to reduce expenditures by \$200,000 for the 2024-2025 budget. Although District leaders and the Williams Bay School Board have controlled spending, the budget gap is widening.

An estimated \$2 million in reductions will be needed to balance the budget over the next three years if the referendum does not pass.

What's at stake?

- ~ Maintaining small class sizes
- ~ Maintaining our high-quality student experience
- ~ Retaining and attracting top-notch staff



PUBLIC WORKS

Good News for our Water Utility Customers

The Williams Bay Water Softening System which has been out of service for necessary in-depth maintenance and cleaning since Mid-November of 2023, will be up and running soon.

While the system has been down, the water safety has not been impacted. You may have noticed that the harder water contains more dissolved minerals which has caused the water to taste and feel differently as well as it may be leaving spots on your dishes and appliances.

The Village appreciates everyone's patience and are pleased with the progress of this project which will ensure we are able to provide great water for years to come.

Tips on Finding Leaks

- Take the cover off the toilet tank. Add enough food coloring to the tank to give strong color to the tank water. Let it stand or sit overnight. If the toilet bowl has turned the color of the dye, you have a toilet leak.
- Look and listen. Take off the tank cover and see if the water is running into the overflow tube and also carefully listen for leaks. Don't rely completely on this test as only extreme leaks can be seen or heard.
- Watch for meter movement. To test the entire building or house for leaks, try this suggestion. First, find the water meter and place a toothpick over the meter pointer. Don't use any water for 15 minutes. After that time, if the pointer has moved, there is a leak somewhere in the house (most likely a toilet).
