TREE REMOVAL PERMITS

According to Section 331-2 of the Village of Williams Bay Municipal Code of Ordinances, Tree Removal Permits are <u>required</u> for all protected trees, which are: any tree 8 inches or more in DBH and trees of any size that are are located on Village owned property, planted as part of an approved landscaping plan, located within shoreland set-back area and/or designated as a Landmark Tree. Tree Removal Permits are \$50.00 for the removal of the first 1-5 trees, plus \$10.00 for each additional tree removed. Removal of more than 30% of the existing trees on a lot ("clear cutting") requires approval through a Conditional Use Permit or Planned Development Zoning. **Failure to obtain a permit will result in doubling the initial cost.**

Other Ways to Vote

- Receive your ballot by mail: Wisconsin voters can receive an absentee ballot by mail. If you would like to vote in the 2022 Partisan Primary Election, submit your request for an absentee ballot by August 4, 2022.
- Vote absentee in-person at Village Hall: July 26th August 5th. You can vote an absentee ballot in person at Village Hall Mondays-Wednesdays and Fridays 9:00am-4:30pm and Thursdays 9:00am-11:30am during these dates.

NO VOTING OR REGISTERING AFTER AUGUST 5TH!

If you need to Register to Vote, please do so before August 5th if possible. You may register at the Polling Place on Election Day if needed. You can register to vote online at myvote.wi.gov, or in-person at Village Hall. There is to be no In-Person Absentee voting after August 5th.

Have Your ID Ready!

When you come to vote, please have your Photo ID ready to help expedite the line. Typically, your Driver's License or U.S. Passport will be your Photo ID, but if you have questions as to what other Photo ID options are available, please visit

POLICE DEPARTMENT



Oh how we love summer in the Bay! It is great to see everyone enjoying their time by the lake, renting Kayaks from the Recreation Department, taking strolls through our Farmer's Market every Friday, and visiting our local stores and ice cream shops! Please take a look at a couple points I would like to make about the coming months as we cruise into summer!



The Village of Williams Bay does NOT allow golf carts on public roads. Low Speed Vehicles (LSVs) are legal forms of transportation. The differences between a golf cart and a low-speed vehicle are very minute but can be found on the Wisconsin DOT website under "LSV vehicles."



This is a friendly reminder that "Resident Parking Only" is currently in effect in signed areas. If you do receive a parking citation, your citation must be paid within 72 hours so as not to accrue an additional fee.



In the unfortunate event that you are involved in an automobile crash, the officer will give you a business card with his/her contact information. On the back of the card are instructions for accessing your report online. The police department no longer releases crash reports through our department. Going through crashreports.wi.gov is the only option. Crash reports are typically available within 48-72 hours. If the crash occurs over the weekend, it could take a little bit longer. If you have questions about the status of your report, you can reach out directly to the officer via the contact information on the business card.



Around this time each year, we receive calls concerning waterfowl. Please remember you are not allowed to feed the birds as this can make them aggressive. Adults and children alike should not approach the waterfowl. We had concerns last year that children were seen throwing objects at the birds. Maltreatment of animals is a crime. If you see anything that needs to be reported, do so immediately by calling or texting the DNR at 1-800-847-9367.



Each summer, traffic increases between cars and pedestrians. We ask that you use extreme caution when driving, walking, or biking Williams Bay. Please be respectful and patient so that we can have a successful and harm free summer.



It's the time of year again when boat launch traffic can become backed up. Please be patient with boat launch attendants as well as any police officers that are working the area. We work diligently to make sure everyone gets a fair opportunity to get their boat launched in a timely manner as well as getting non-boating traffic moving. This may require boat traffic to make a couple laps around the area in order to keep traffic flowing.

KISHWAUKETOE NATURE CONSERVANCY (KNC) KISHWAUKETOE BOOK RELEASED MARCH 4, 2022

In the fall of 2018 Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy volunteer, board member and master naturalist Jim Killian and local professional photographer/graphic designer Jen Schildgen partnered to begin compiling the deep history and story of the Conservancy. Through research of historical documents, review of literature and the writings of others, and the use of photography, artwork and other imagery, the result of this collaboration is "*Kishwauketoe: A Nature Conservancy for the Children of Tomorrow*". The Friends of Kishwauketoe were very generous in supporting this initiative by raising the funds required to cover the full cost of publication. This 256-page full-color coffee table book is available for purchase through a number of local retail outlets, as well as the Williams Bay Barrett Memorial Library and Village Hall. The book is also available for purchase from the Friends of Kishwauketoe's website at <u>www.friendsofknc.org</u>. 100% of the proceeds from the sale of the book will go toward continuing restoration and maintenance efforts at Kishwauketoe.

How Is Our School Funded?



K-12 funding in Wisconsin is a complicated topic. The high majority (over 75% for our district) of general fund revenue is determined by the revenue limit formula. This formula includes multiplying the district's membership (on a 3-year average) by a "per-pupil" amount. This amount started with the creation of the revenue limit formula in 1993 and has been in the past (but not always) increased by the state budget.

This per-pupil amount differs among school districts. Membership for the revenue limit is defined by resident students attending the district or open enrolling out to another public school district. The membership is converted to a full time equivalent (FTE) count, with 4K students and 3 year old special ed students counting as less than a 1.0 FTE.

In the revenue limit formula, after the 3-year membership average is multiplied by the per-pupil amount, exemptions are added. Some of the exemptions include a declining enrollment exemption, voucher exemptions and operating referendum exemptions that increase the revenue limit authority for districts. After the exemptions are added, a district has their total revenue limit authority. This is the amount the district can generate in spendable revenue.



This total revenue limit authority is then divided between state equalization aid (the state's largest aid to districts) and the local tax levy. The amount of state equalization aid a district receives is based on their total equalized property value divided by their membership. The higher this amount is, the less equalization aid a district receives and vice versa. Williams Bay School District has a very high property value per member, which means we receive very little equalization aid from the state. Almost all of our revenue limit authority is paid for with local taxes. Other districts may receive more from equalization aid. It is important to remember that equalization aid from the state does not increase total revenue but offsets the tax levy.

The revenue limit formula also determines the mill/tax rate, which is calculated by taking the total levy (general fund, community service and debt), dividing by the total equalized value of the district and multiplying by 1,000. We mentioned above that students that live in our district but attend another public district are included in our membership for revenue limit purposes. With those students, we also have a corresponding expense paid to their attending district. The amount we pay to the attending district is less than what we receive on the revenue limit by counting that student. For students that open enroll into the district, we receive the same funding amount for those students that open enroll out. In summary, the district receives funding for students that open enroll into the district, but it is less than what we receive in funding for a student that lives in the district.



The district receives some federal funding in the form of grants, but it is a very small percentage of our overall revenue. That has increased slightly recently with ESSER (Covid-relief) funds. Other annual federal grants include Title grants and IDEA grants for students with disabilities. The state also has special education aid, which covers approximately 25-30% of expenditures for students with disabilities not included in the IDEA grants. The remaining costs are covered with a transfer from the district's general fund. The district also has separate funds for food service, community service and debt. These other funds are all self-sustaining and surpluses are not allowed to be transferred to the general fund. For example, if the district has a surplus in their food service fund, they must use that surplus for future food service and not for general fund expenditures.

The Wisconsin school financing formula is complicated, so check back in the next newsletter to learn how Williams Bay School District's revenue limit authority is calculated and how the statewide fiscal challenges affect our district specifically.
