### **2022 PROPERTY TAX INFORMATION**

Tax bills are anticipated to be mailed sometime between December 5th – 9th. However, your bill may be available sooner at the Walworth County website at

https://ascent.co.walworth.wi.us/LandRecords/PropertyListing/RealEstateTaxParcel#/Search.

If the mailing address is incorrect, you can send a request to change the mailing address through the Walworth County website.

If your property is your primary residence as of January 1, 2021, please review your tax bill to make sure you are receiving the lottery credit. If you are not receiving this credit, our office can assist you to get the credit applied to your property tax bill.

### We are also excited to announce that online credit card processing will be available this year!!

The online payment processing of property taxes would be available during the first installment collection period. The system will only accept payments for current year taxes and will not accept overpayments.

Online payments for 2022 property taxes payments will be processed through the Walworth County website. Instructions on how to use this feature will be available on our website once tax bills are available.

#### Fees for Online Payments

You can pay your taxes online via E-check for .50 $\P$  (you will need to provide your checking routing & account number), via debit card or credit card (2.35% convenience fee on the amount you are paying).



### WATER BILL CORRECTION

As you may have noticed on your 2nd Quarter water bill the Fire Protection charge was not updated to the new rate. The rate increase information was provided with your 1st Quarter bill. As a result of this, there will be an additional line item with a charge for the difference of the old charge and the new charge. We apologize for any confusion this may cause. ### **▶ LEAF COLLECTION**

The Village will collect leaves via a vacuuming process in April and November. The Village will routinely collect leaves at weekly intervals, therefore, calls to schedule this service are not needed.

- Place leaves by the roadside in a long row rather than a big pile.
- No bags.
- No ashes (burned leaves will not be vacuumed).
- **Absolutely no branches.** To get rid of branches and sticks, please use the Brush Chipping program which can be found at www.williamsbay.org, or by calling 262-245-2700 and selecting option 9.
- Leaves on private driveways or alleys will not be collected.
- This service is provided for Improved Single Family Residential Properties only.

## FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dear Williams Bay Residents,

There will be an important question on the ballot in the November election. On August 24, 2022, the Williams Bay Village Board approved including a referendum question that would fund the cost of providing 24-hour emergency medical services to the Village.

The residents of Williams Bay have long relied on EMS volunteers to respond to emergency medical calls. Like many other communities throughout the state, the number of EMS volunteers are drastically declining while the volume of calls continues to rise. The additional funding will allow the Village to be serviced by full-time, paid, professional personnel which will ensure a high quality of care and a quick response to calls.

Over the next two months residents will have multiple opportunities to ask questions of the Village board and staff at different public and organizational meetings. Residents will also receive numerous mailings that will help to explain the need for the additional funds and why it is so important.

The referendum question will appear on the Tuesday November 8, 2022, ballot as follows:

Under state law, the increase in the levy of the Village of Williams Bay for the tax to be imposed for the next fiscal year, 2023, is limited to 1.67%, which results in a levy of \$2,982,296. Shall the Village of Williams Bay be allowed to exceed this limit and increase the levy for the next fiscal year, 2023, for the purpose of providing the Village with 24-hour emergency medical services, by a total of 31.120% which results in a levy of \$3,910,373, and on an ongoing basis, include the increase of \$928,077 for each fiscal year going forward?

- Receive your ballot by mail: Wisconsin voters can receive an absentee ballot by mail. If you would like to vote in the 2022 General Election, submit your request for an absentee ballot online at myvote.wi.gov or by filling out the form at Village Hall by November 3, 2022.
- Vote absentee in-person at Village Hall: You can vote an absentee ballot inperson at Village Hall October 25th - November 4th. The hours are Mondays-Wednesdays and Fridays 9:00am-4:30pm and Thursdays 9:00am-11:30am during these dates only.

## NO VOTING OR REGISTERING AFTER NOVEMBER 4TH!

If you need to Register to Vote, please do so before November 4th if possible. You may register at the Polling Place on Election Day if needed. You can register to vote online at myvote.wi.gov, or inperson at Village Hall. There is to be no In-Person Absentee voting after November 4th.

When you come to vote, please have your Photo ID ready to help expedite the line. Typically, your Driver's License or U.S. Passport will be your Photo ID, but if you have questions as to what other Photo ID options are available, please visit

## POLICE DEPARTMENT



The Police Department is excited to participate in Boo in the Bay on Saturday, October 29th. The Rec Department will provide more information on the details of this event. Kishwauketoe bow hunting takes place November 1st to December 31st. To be eligible to bow hunt, you must provide a valid Hunter's Safety Certificate and a current state of Wisconsin Bow Deer Hunt license. If you are born before 1974, a hunting license is not required. To register, bring a copy of your Hunter's Safety Certificate, Wisconsin Bow Deer Hunting License, and Driver's License to the Williams Bay Police Department BEFORE entering KNC for the purpose of deer bow hunting.



Winter parking restrictions are enforced November 15th to April 15th. Between the hours of 2:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m., you are restricted from parking or leaving a standing vehicle on any Village street. This restriction is active with or without snow. If you or a guest needs to temporarily park on the street overnight, you must call the Police Department to receive permission.



As a reminder, if you are leaving town for an extended period of time, the police department is happy to keep an eye on your home. To request frequent house checks, please fill out our online request form. You will find it at williamsbay.org on the left side of the Police Department page under "House Check Form." We no longer take hard copy forms, so please utilize our electronic form.





## **KISHWAUKETOE NATURE CONSERVANCY (KNC)**

"Our love affair with this amazing park started 2 1/2 years ago..."

Testimonial from Donald Tomaska





Lynn and I are recent retirees who bought our second home in Williams Bay during March 2020. Shortly afterwards, we walked down the hill on Route 67 toward the bay and first noticed the entrance to Kishwauketoe. We decided to try one of the many trails and quickly realized what many others already know – there's nothing quite like it!

During the next 2+ years we found Kishwauketoe to be a special place where we could leave any troubles behind and get in touch with ourselves thru nature. Lynn and I now walk the park several times a week and usually take a different route each time. We particularly like early morning or sunset walks and always see exciting new things. We've met a wide range of people, from serious bird watchers and plant lovers to individuals like us who just want to take a walk in a pretty place with no noise, music or cell phones.

For the first time this summer, we have participated in some of the unique activities offered by KNC. This includes the famous "Friday morning walk with Harold Friestad" (visionary founder of KNC), Saturday morning botanical tour with Josh (KNC expert) and a recent presentation by the two local authors of the exciting new book - Kishwauketoe – A Nature Conservancy for the Children of Tomorrow. We soon hope to join a Friday night moonlight walk followed by a campfire and s'mores (just like my boy scout days).

As we've learned more about KNC, we wanted to tell more people about it! We're sometimes surprised when we exit the park and meet people who say they have never walked thru Kishwauketoe (or know anything about it.) They don't realize what they're missing!



### **DID YOU KNOW?**

As residents of Williams Bay, we are all aware of the existence of the **Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy (KNC).** *For some*, it may only be a lovely view when driving or walking by. *For many*, it is a wonderful sanctuary to take a year-round hike, join Harold Friestad on his early morning informative walks, join others for a moon hike and bonfire, compete in the annual 5K run or walk, or snow shoe and cross-country ski in the winter. *For most*, there are many interesting facts that may not be known.

**The name "Kishwauketoe" (Kish-wau-ke-toe):** Is derived from the name given to Geneva Lake by the Potawatomi Native-American people. It means "clear or sparkling water". The name of **Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy** was the winning entry in a 1990 Name the Park contest by local residents George Johnson and Sharon Kolbasuk, selected from 189 entries.

**Rescued:** In April of 1990 the Village of Williams Bay purchased 231 acres of land now known as **Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy** to prevent proposed residential and commercial development of the land. In July of 1990 **KNC** became a protected conservancy. In November of 2011 a Land Protection Agreement was created to ensure **KNC** will remain permanently undeveloped and unspoiled for future generations.

**Tax Dollars:** No tax dollars fund the **Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy**. It is maintained solely through donations and volunteer time. The first public donation was for \$75 in 1990 from the Concerned Citizen's Committee.

**Wetland Tributary: Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy** contains the largest wetland tributary feeding Geneva Lake and is a prime source of clean water that feeds our pristine lake.

**Want to learn more?** These are only a few of the things Williams Bay residents may not know. Williams Bay resident and Kishwauketoe Board Member, James Killian, has written and coauthored a book "Kishwauketoe – A Nature Conservancy for the Children of Tomorrow" with Lake Geneva resident Jen Schildgen that is currently for sale at local businesses and online at www.friendsofknc.org. 100% of the proceeds from the sale of this book are designated to support the ongoing work of "Friends of Kishwauketoe" and continued restoration and maintenance of the **KNC** property.

## How Does the State Funding Formula Impact the Williams Bay School District?

As mentioned in our last newsletter article, over 75% of our district's general fund revenue is determined by the state revenue limit formula. This formula includes multiplying the district's membership (on a 3-year average) by a "per-pupil" amount.

In the revenue limit formula, after the 3-year membership average is multiplied by the perpupil amount, exemptions are added. Some of the exemptions include a declining enrollment exemption, voucher exemptions and operating referendum exemptions that increase the revenue limit authority for districts. After the exemptions are added, a district has their total revenue limit authority. This is the amount the district can generate in spendable revenue.



This total revenue limit authority is then divided between state equalization aid (the state's largest aid to districts) and the local tax levy. The amount of state equalization aid a district receives is based on their total equalized property value divided by their membership. The higher this amount is, the less equalization aid a district receives and vice versa. Williams Bay School District has a very high property value per member, which means we receive very little equalization aid from the state. Almost all of our revenue limit authority is paid for with local taxes. Other districts may receive more from equalization aid. It is important to remember that equalization aid from the state does not increase total revenue but offsets the tax levy.

One misconception about school funding is that declining enrollment has immediate impact on a school district's financials. The State of Wisconsin has a declining enrollment exemption that acts like a parachute and assists districts in allowing them to maintain their revenue limit authority despite losing students. It doesn't negatively impact a district until they start increasing enrollment. Further, funding is based on a 3 year average, so it can take 3 years of growth before a district can see the full impact of an upswing in enrollment.

Schools throughout Wisconsin are facing "a fiscal cliff." Simply google "Wisconsin Schools Fiscal Cliff" and you'll find a plethora of news articles from across the state discussing this topic. Williams Bay is no different. Short term COVID-related ESSER funding and high inflation costs are just two reasons why funding is coming to an abrupt drop. Most school districts in the Lake Geneva area are in similar situations, as you have seen several had referendums last year and we will continue to see more local school referendums in the next year or two. We'll continue to discuss Williams Bay School District's funding mechanisms and financial needs in the upcoming newsletters. Please continue to stay tuned in and informed as our long-term financial picture develops.


What fond memories do you have of Williams Bay School District?
