To order beach tags, guest passes and parking permits by mail, please fill out the form on the last page of this newsletter and mail it in with payment for the items to be mailed back to you. These items can also be purchased in-person at Village Hall during normal business hours. The form is not necessary for in-person purchases.

- Resident Parking Permits: \$2.00 each - Limit 3 per household
- Resident Beach Tags: \$3.00 each - For family members living in the home.
- Resident Guest Passes: \$10.00 each/10 visits per card - Limit 3 per household.
 - Residents must provide proof of residency (driver's license, water bill)
 - Renters must provide proof of residency (lease, water bill)
 - Tags must be attached to an article of beach clothing (swimsuit, cover up)
 - Tags CANNOT be attached to towels, hats or bags
- The following is NOT allowed on the beach:
 - Smoking, Alcoholic Beverages, Glass Containers, Grills or Fires, Pets
- Lifeguards are on duty June 4th - August 28th* plus Labor Day weekend (weather permitting)

VILLAGE OF WILLIAMS BAY MUNICIPAL WATER UTILITY

The Williams Bay Municipal Water Utility has been approved by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSCW) to increase water rates. The increase is necessary due to a 259.49% increase in gross plant investment and a 199.25% increase in operating expenses since the last water rate case was completed in 1986.

The total increase in water revenues requested is \$119,476 which will result in an estimated overall rate increase of 15.08% over the water utility's present revenues. The quarterly water bill for an average residential customer with a 5/8-inch or 3/4-inch meter who uses 9,000 gallons of water per quarter will increase from \$79.43 to \$90.69, or 14.18%.

The new rates will be effective April 1, 2022. A detailed listing of all the Utility rates that were approved by the Village Board of Trustees can be found on the Village of Williams Bay website, www.williamsbay.org. MEET THE CANDIDATES

ROBERT UMANS

CANDIDATE FOR VILLAGE TRUSTEE

It has been an honor to have served as your Village Trustee for the past two years. I currently chair the Water and Sewer committee. I also serve on the Protective Services, Street and Highway's and Zoning Board of Appeals committees. I also represent our Village as a director on the GLEA (Geneva Lake Environmental Agency) board.



As your Village Trustee, it is my opinion that the prime responsibilities are Police and Fire protection, EMS service, a balanced Budget as well as make sure that our Water & Sewer infrastructure is dependable and meets today's standards and needs.

It is therefore that as the chair of the Water & Sewer committee I have taken the lead to collect W&S infrastructure data with the objective to put together a sensible plan to address immediate and future infrastructure needs.

The last two years have been very productive in gaining knowledge about the aging condition of our Water and Sewer infrastructure. Doug Snyder (Village engineer – Baxter and Woodman), graciously donated his time and knowledge on many Friday afternoon meetings and he has been a tremendous help with these studies and his recommendations. We put together a Capital Improvement program and sorted the needed improvements into a systematic approach to be executed in the next 5-10 years.

It was immediately apparent early in 2020 that a conventional Water Rate increase would be needed to pay for the upcoming expenses. In September that year we hired the Baker Tilly company to assist us with the PSC water rate increase application. This application was filed on time on July 30th last year and we expect to receive a formal detailed rate increase confirmation letter from the PSC before the end of March this year. This rate increase is projected to be minimal.

Separately, we will also need a small Sewer rate increase. Route 67 (Elkhorn Road) is scheduled to be redone Spring 2023 and we will need new 12" sewer pipes from the Fire station to the Lions Club Field house.

Impact fees:

The total financial burden of paying for existing water infrastructure upgrades as well as future water infrastructure expansions should not totally fall on just the current water users. Impact fees are calculated against infrastructure improvements that must be built due to new property developments. Our current impact fees date back to 1992 calculations and must be raised. All increases will need full Village Board approval. Water and Sewer rate increases for current users are projected to be modest. All increases will allow us to borrow funds and start construction.

My plan is to schedule a public meeting this May in the Village Hall to share detailed information about the rate increases and provide you with the projected sequence of upgrades for both Water and Sewer. I encourage you to attend this meeting and share your thoughts and concerns.

In closing, I want to thank you for your continued support and encouragement. It is greatly appreciated.

MEET THE CANDIDATES

LOWELL WRIGHT CANDIDATE FOR VILLAGE TRUSTEE

I am honored by the opportunity I've had to serve you as a Trustee for the Village of Williams Bay. I ask for your vote for another term. While EMS is important, I suspect development projects are a top-of-mind concern for many voters. Many residents want to see development in the downtown business district as evidenced in the recent WBBA survey. At the same time, no one wants over-development. We will see development over the coming years. There are many safeguards to protect the character of the Bay and guide development such that residents will find the results appropriate. The Comprehensive Plan, now being updated, specifies intended land use: single-family, multi-family, commercial, etc. Village Ordinances set many detailed requirements that will guide any development. Finally, many public hearings before the Plan Commission and Village Board will provide opportunities for community input. As Chair of the Building, Zoning and Ordinance Committee, I have insight into these protections and will ensure they are used.

Some things about me:

- Our family has owned property here for nearly 80 years. Ruth and I have been here seasonally for 40 of those and lived here full time for six years.
- I've served as Trustee for nearly two years. I've been Chair of the Building, Zoning and Ordinance Committee. I also serve on the Finance and Personnel Committee and the Parks and Lakefront Committee. I know what it takes to build consensus and to move matters forward. I know the work it takes to be an effective Trustee.
- I'm a member of Delavan Christian Reformed Church. I'm a member of the Williams Bay Lions Club. I volunteer at Open Arms Free Clinic, at the Spirit of Hope Homeless Shelter and Meals on Wheels.

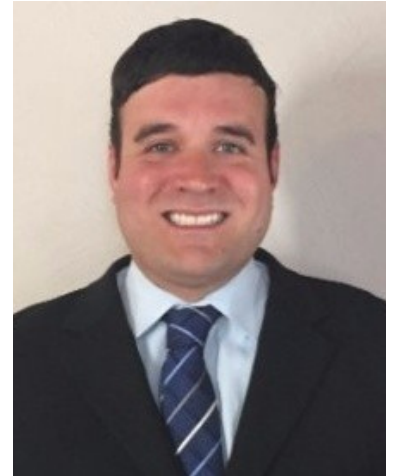

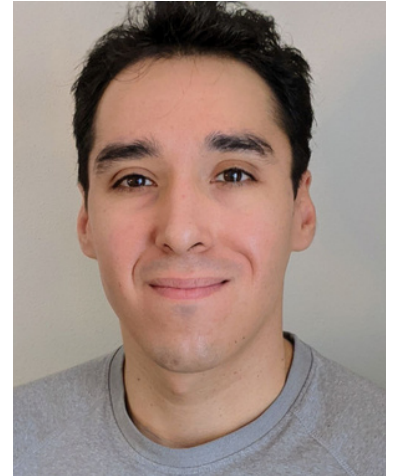

Superintendent's Advisory Committee Formed

The Superintendent's Advisory Committee was recently formed by District Administrator Dr. White. The committee is a representative body that will communicate on a variety of important topics raised by the superintendent and various key stakeholders. This committee is collaborative and provides an opportunity for two-way communication with parents, community members and staff members on important matters that affect the district.

The committee has met twice so far and has reviewed the district's strategic plan, a new communication and marketing plan for the district as well as reviewed the responses of the Williams Bay Business Association's survey - specifically question number six which directly related to the school district. Going forward, some projects the committee will be working on include: improving district communication with all organizations in the community, partnering with the Village Administrator, the Parks and Recreation Department as well as Barrett Memorial Library to provide additional services to the community.

Meet the Candidates

We would like to introduce you to the three candidates that are running for our school board in the Spring Election to be held on Tuesday, April 5th.



Jack Lothian

Why are you running for the School Board?

I joined the school board as the construction of the new elementary school was being completed, with the intention of representing all members of the community and making decisions based on what is best for the kids. In the past two years, there have been many tough decisions to make regarding the safe operation of our schools. I have based my decisions on feedback from the constituents of the district, as opposed to simply voting for what I would prefer to see. This is evidenced in the mask policy and other safety protocols during the pandemic. A few of the non-Covid related initiatives I have supported include the implementation of a Student Resource Officer, the one-to-one Chromebook plan, and the College and Career Readiness program to give students more options post-high school. In addition, the board has developed a Strategic Plan based on the four goals of our district.

What are your qualifications?

I am a graduate of Williams Bay High School (class of '89), a former 6th grade teacher at Williams Bay Elementary, and a current parent of Williams Bay students. I have a B.S. in Economics from UW Madison and an M.Ed. from Lewis University. I was a classroom teacher for nine years in Chicago and in Williams Bay. I have served on the board for the past six years, with the honor of serving as president the past five. I am also involved in the local Lions Club and have volunteered time at Kishwauketoe and various local events.

What do you believe are the current challenges facing education/school boards?

One of the most important issues we are facing as a district is the declining enrollment in the district, which is mirrored in the surrounding area and the state. The two main revenue sources for the district are the funding from the state and a portion of local property taxes. Our funding from the state is calculated based on our enrollment in the fall, meaning that as enrollment declines, so does the income side of our budget.

The administration has been bringing ideas to the board during the past year to increase revenue and reduce expenses. These ideas have included a marketing campaign, to increase open enrollment at Williams Bay and help bolster enrollment. Another program that was approved by the board at the February meeting was a 3K program to invite families with younger children into the district in hopes that they decide to stay enrolled here. Non-essential maintenance and improvements have been put on hold until we weather this storm. With smaller elementary class sizes, we will be moving to two sections instead of three at some grade levels as well as making similar moves at the middle and high schools. This is never a path we want to go down, but it is one that we must do in order to remain fiscally responsible. Despite these cuts, the district will still offer all of the same academic and extra-curricular options for students. If reelected, I will continue to work with the rest of the board and all members of the school district towards a solution that is both educationally and economically sound for the community.



Sam Perkins

Why are you running for the School Board?

First and foremost to give back. Having graduated from the Bay, having had two kids that have graduated from the Bay and have two more currently attending, the school has given me so much and I want to give something back. I am invested in the success of this school going forward. The Bay provides a unique mix of opportunity and the personal touch of being a small school, which is something very special to me. A main priority will be to continue the tradition of academic excellence that Williams Bay has continued to stand for over the years, through community and parental engagement.

What are your qualifications?

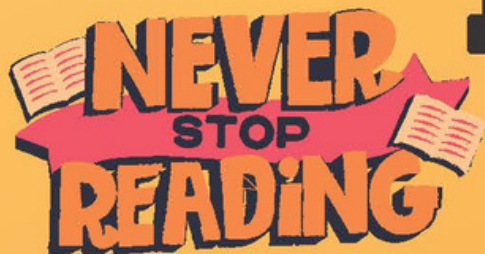
